



## Honeybee Behaviour

Through understanding the natural behaviour of honeybees, we can better prepare ourselves as beekeepers to predict or respond to their needs. We will explore honeybee behaviour in areas such as seasonal population variation, communication mechanisms, foraging behaviour and organisation, workload distribution, reproduction, and swarming. In each of these we will discuss what is understood of honeybee behaviour, and the factors that influence this behaviour, in order to answer questions such as "Why do bees do this?" or "What would bees do next?".

## Directions


Our training centre is located at

**Blackbury Honey Farm, Southleigh, Colyton, Devon, EX24 6JF**

between the towns of Honiton, Sidmouth, and Seaton.

Blackbury Honey Farm is located about a mile from Southleigh village so please do **not** follow Southleigh signs – instead follow the brown **Blackbury Camp** and **Honey Farm** signs.

**Satnav users** – the postcode is inaccurate - when it tells you that you have arrived, follow the brown sign for Blackbury Camp.



## By car

1. Honiton is reached by the A30, which connects with the M5 at Exeter and the A303 and A35 to the East.
2. Follow signs out of Honiton for Sidmouth on the A375.
3. At the crossroads with the Hare and Hounds pub, turn left and follow the brown tourist signs for Blackbury Camp.
4. Follow this road for about 2 miles – do **not** go to Southleigh village.
5. Turn left where indicated by the brown Honey Farm sign, and Blackbury Honey Farm is the first gateway on the left. There is ample parking.

## By train

Honiton station is about five miles away and is served by the London Waterloo – Exeter service. Taxis from Honiton station can be booked on 01404 850800 – please ask to be taken to Blackbury Camp, Southleigh and you will pass our gate.
